Auction items include a lottery tree, diamond ring, and tickets to future Black Box comedy events. Costume wearers are encouraged to be as creative as they can be and there will be prizes."

While fun is on the agenda for the evening, there is a serious purpose as well. The event is a fundraiser for the Foundation, in support of its mission to bring live theater to the children of the Treasure Coast and to support the infrastructure of the theater itself.
